
## Author Spotlight

You have until **Saturday 10th September** to complete the challenge.



This term we have been reading the hungry caterpillar and learning about life cycles. Each child has been given their own caterpillar to look after and watch them transform into beautiful butterflies.








### We love reading.....


We really love these Usborne books: "1000 Animals" and "100 things that go."

"I like all the animals."
















### Year Ine

We talked about how it was important for George to be resilient and keep trying even though he was finding flying tricky.


We discussed some of the things we found challenging and how we kept trying.


'When I learnt to ride my bike, I found it tricky but then I kept on practising.'





# Year Two








Cosmin: I like Pandora because the events are all different and it goes from happy to sad.


Jasper: I like Theseus and the Minotaur because it has a good moral of making sure you do things properly.

Ollie: I like Icarus and Daedalus because I would like to fly like them.


Sam: I like Icarus and Daedalus because I like mazes and puzzles. Aleeza and Charlie: I like Theseus and

Ava: My favourite myth was Hercules because he never gave up.


Bethuel: My favourite myth is Hercules: he was the strongest man because he defeated the Hydra.

Max Po: My favourite myth is The Trojan Horse because the Greeks defeated Troy.










### Year Four

#### Why did Lila climb the mountain?


'She climbed the mountain to tell the sky the saddest things she knew so it would rain. They needed water to drink and if it would rain it wouldn't be so dry.' (Grace)

'She told the sky about the time she burnt her finger and when her brother cut his leg.' (Grace) What was your favourite bit?


'I like the bit when the rain comes because they can have a drink and survive. Everyone is so overjoyed.' (Aarav)

This is gruesome and funny at the same time.




### Lilly-Mae Mega Monster






# Year Six


We gathered notes about the four main characters and then wrote a character description.


We recommend The Explorer because the main characters are all children and there is a real sense of adventure and at some points – peril!




We are enjoying The Explorer because we can really imagine being in the rainforest because of Katherine Rundell's descriptions.
